

These are the most exciting discoveries from our editors' most recent tastings, published exclusively in Wine Spectator Insider. They are high-scoring wines from around the world that may be difficult to find, but are worth seeking out.

#### MASSETO Toscana 2015 98 points | \$700 | 390 cases imported | Red

This red leads off with exquisite notes of vanilla and toast framing black cherry, blackberry, cedar and iron flavors. Ripe and powerful, yet polished and silky, with dense tannins well-integrated into the structure. The fruit returns in the end, along with a licorice note. A superb young version, showing fine potential. Merlot. Best from 2021 through 2035. From Italy.—*B.S.* 

# CHÂTEAU DE ST.-COSME

#### Gigondas Le Poste 2016 98 points | \$143 | 22 cases imported | Red

Offers a perfumed feel to the lavender, violet and savory notes that lead off, followed quickly by ripe, focused fresh cherry, cassis and raspberry puree flavors, all harnessed by very fine chalky minerality, which extends through the lengthy finish. Best from 2020 through 2040. From France.-J.M.

#### CHÂTEAU DE ST.-COSME Gigondas Le Claux 2016 97 points | \$143 | 79 cases imported | Red

This offers a range of sage, savory and bay leaf aromas followed by crushed black cherry, bitter plum and red currant fruit, all supported by racy, mouthwatering chalky cut. Dense, but fresh and well-defined throughout. Long finish. Best from 2020 through 2040. From France.—*J.M.* 

## **DOMAINE DES BOSQUETS** Gigondas La Colline... 2016

### 96 points | \$75 | 40 cases imported | Red

This delivers a gorgeous display of fruit, with raspberry, boysenberry and blackberry notes in lockstep as they race through, infused with light anise, bergamot and rooibos tea accents along the way. The racy, chalky structure holds the finish, giving this sleek tension. Best from 2020 through 2036. From France.—J.M.

#### DOMAINE DES BOSQUETS Gigondas Le Lieu Dit... 2016 95 points | \$55 | 100 cases imported | Red

Deliciously ripe, featuring a bright and lively display of red currant, raspberry and blackberry coulis flavors that race along, underscored by fine but persistent chalky tannins and backed by lilac, violet, rooibos tea and savory notes along the way. The long finish ripples with fresh acidity. Best from 2020 through 2036. From France.—*J.M.* 

### CARPINETO

#### Vino Nobile di Montepulciano Riserva 2013 95 points | \$30 | 6,400 cases imported | Red

The stunning bouquet of ripe black cherry, black currant, leather and woodsy spice notes is enticing, while the sweet fruit is a match for the dense structure. The lengthy finish lingers, with tobacco, eucalyptus and iron accents. Drink now through 2030. From Italy.—*B.S.*
